


Pathway Visalia Men's Ministry: Jan. 8th - "The Whole Armor of God" "EPHESIANS"

We last left off with the question:

QUESTION: During our November study, we talked about how we as parents aren't to show favoritism to our children. Have you felt like our Heavenly Father showed favoritism to other believers instead of you? If so, why do you think that you felt that way?

Chapter 6:10-20 : "THE WHOLE ARMOR OF GOD"
The whole armor of God

10. A final word: Be strong in the Lord (draw your strength from Him and be empowered through your union with Him) and in his mighty power.

"A final word"- As Paul finishes up this letter to the Ephesians, it is a grand finale to this wonderful letter. He concludes it with a huge reality. There is a spiritual war going on all around us. As we delve into this last part of the letter, we all need to take note of the truth of the spiritual vs. the physical. We can easily be lulled into complacency.

QUESTION: Why do you think that we can be so easily lulled into complacency?

QUESTION: What does complacency look like in your life?

QUESTION: Paul said "be strong in the Lord" - What do we need to do to be strong in the Lord?

11. Put on all of God's armor (for His precepts are like the splendid armor of a heavily-armed soldier) so that you will be able to stand firm against all strategies of the devil. 12. For we are not fighting against flesh-and-blood enemies, but against evil rulers and authorities of the unseen world, against mighty powers in this dark world, and against evil spirits in the heavenly places.

QUESTION: We have all seen evil on display recently, but this human evil is only "flesh-and-blood enemies". What does Paul instruct us to do to defend ourselves "against the evil rulers and authorities of the unseen world, against mighty powers in this dark world, and against evil spirits in the heavenly places."?

QUESTION: Share a time when you faced a situation when it was clearly a spiritual battle and what you did to "stand firm"?

QUESTION: Let's discuss the increasing pace, or the acceleration, that we can see in this world as the "evil rulers and authorities of the unseen world" attacking.

QUESTION: We have seen new cloaking technology (optical camouflage) being used in warfare. What are some examples of how the devil deceives people?

13. Therefore, put on every piece of God's armor so you will be able to resist the enemy in the time of evil. Then after the battle you will still be standing firm. 14. Stand your ground, putting on the belt of truth and the body armor (put on the breastplate of integrity and of moral virtue and right standing with God).

"Therefore" - This is the connection between the warning from Paul regarding the spiritual battle that we are facing and what we need to do to stand firm.

QUESTION: The first point that Paul advises us to do is; "to put on every piece of God's armor". "Every piece" - What situations could people find themselves in where it was critical for their own safety to make sure that they had all the equipment that they needed to protect themselves?

QUESTION: This first piece is the "belt of truth" - Why do you think Paul starts with the belt and why do you think that Paul says that the belt is "truth"?

QUESTION: Many of us were with unbelieving family members during Christmas where "truth" is defined in a different way. Can you share any conversations that you had about the truth of the Gospel message, and perhaps the worldly message that others shared with you.

QUESTION: Body armor/breastplate of integrity - when Paul wrote this passage, he was very familiar with the Roman solders metal plates or chains that covered the body from the neck to the waist, both front and back. Today, we have police officers using Kevlar vests. What is the spiritual body armor that is discussed here in verse 14?

QUESTION: It is interesting that Paul says to: "put on the breastplate of integrity and of moral virtue and right standing with God" - in that we are all sinners and there have been, and are, times where we may fail in "integrity and moral virtue", but it doesn't affect our "right standing with God" - why do you think that is true?

QUESTION: When we find ourselves in a position of weakness, where our body armor is not going to protect us from spiritual attacks, what should we do?

15. For shoes [to face the enemy with the firm-footed stability, the promptness, and the readiness produced by the good news] of the Gospel of peace. [Isa. 52:7.] put on the peace that comes from the Good News so that you will be fully prepared. 16. In addition to all of these, hold up the shield of faith to stop the fiery arrows of the devil.

Isaiah 52:7. How beautiful on the mountains are the feet of the messenger who brings good news, the good news of peace and salvation, the news that the God of Israel reigns!

For shoes:

QUESTION: Have you ever played a sport or been in the mountains where you had to wear cleats or ice cleats? How did they help you to stand your ground or in keeping you from falling on the icy ground?

QUESTION: Why is it so important "to face the enemy with the firmfooted stability, the promptness, and the readiness produced by the good news"? QUESTION: What do we need to do to keep moving forward in ministering to others - so that that we don't trip ourselves up, and to make sure that we are ready to share?

QUESTION: "put on the peace that comes from the Good News" - What does it look like when a believer has cloaked themselves in the peace that comes from walking in the Good News?

QUESTION: Can you share a time where your peaceful countenance ministered to someone without you even sharing a word to them.

Greg Laurie's devo a few weeks ago was addressing the issue of every believer taking the responsibility and privilege of sharing the Good News.

"I have fought the good fight, I have finished the race, and I have remained faithful." —2 Timothy 4:7

One day, we will give our final words. We may be aware they're our last words, but then again, we may not have that luxury.

In 2 Timothy 4, the apostle Paul wrote his final words. His turbulent life was coming to an end, and he had truly made a difference.

An amazing series of events led to his being in the dungeon where he wrote his epistle to Timothy. It began when Paul wanted to go to Jerusalem and preach there. But a prophet named Agabus took the belt Paul had been wearing, wrapped it around his own arms and legs, and said, "So shall the owner of this belt be bound by the Jewish leaders in Jerusalem and turned over to the Gentiles" (Acts 21:11 NLT).

When the believers heard this, they pleaded with Paul not to go to Jerusalem. But Paul told them, "Why all this weeping? You are breaking my heart! I am ready not only to be jailed at Jerusalem but even to die for the sake of the Lord Jesus" (verse 13 NLT).

Jim Elliot was a twentieth-century martyr who died in his endeavor to take the gospel to the Waorani tribe of Ecuador. Years earlier he wrote in his journal, "He is no fool who gives what he cannot keep to gain what he cannot lose."

In the same way, Paul gave his life completely to the Lord. He didn't fear what others could do to him. Writing to the church in Corinth, he said, "Don't you realize that your body is the temple of the Holy Spirit, who lives in you and was given to you by God? You do not belong to yourself, for God bought you with a high price. So you must honor God with your body" (1 Corinthians 6:19–20 NLT). **hold up the shield**
